STEP FIVE

ADMITTED TO GOD, TO OURSELVES, AND TO ANOTHER HUMAN BEING THE EXACT NATURE OF OUR WRONGS

Overcoming Fear

Fear is a natural reaction to confession. Although you may want recovery desperately, confronting the nature of your wrongs and admitting long-held secrets to God and to another human being may be terrifying. If you allow these feelings to stop your progress at step five, you stop moving forward in your recovery and the disease of alcohol addiction will take over once more. Alcoholics Anonymous Step Four has prepared you for step five, and by finding the courage to overcome that fear of rejection or the shame of your confession, you experience honesty on a deeper level than in your first step of admission, and you break the pattern of denial that often plagues those suffering with alcoholism.

5th Step: Confessing to Yourself

Step 5 requires not only that we admit to ourselves the exact nature of our wrongs, but that we embark on an honest self-evaluation of our faults. This part of the fifth step helps to remove your egoism and helps to minimize your fear. This enables you to work on your remaining confessions to God and another human being with honesty, openness and courage.

Why God?

In the third step of AA's recovery process, you ask a power greater than yourself for honesty, courage and willingness to work on each step of your recovery. The admission of your exact wrongs in the fifth step is part of the spiritual awakening that is the basis of AA's Twelve Steps. Your willingness to approach God or your Higher Power honestly is critical to your recovery. Because many alcoholics may feel unworthy of a relationship with God, this revelation to Him enables them to draw closer to God and to experience the love and acceptance that He offers. Building a positive relationship with your Higher Power also carries into your relationships with others and this is essential to recovery.

Confession to Another Human Being

An alcoholic is rarely able to break the cycle of addiction without help. Part of recovering from alcohol addiction is building your self-esteem so that you realize what you have to share is worth listening to, and that you are worthy of forgiveness and respect. The person you select to share your fifth step confession with should be someone who understands the process of recovery and someone who wants to help you get through it. For this reason many choose to complete step five with a sponsor, or someone from within your AA group who will understand the process of recover and who will be compassionate and respectful of your desire not to share your confidences with anyone else. A sponsor will also help you maintain perspective as to the exact nature of the wrongs you are confessing and will not allow you to slip into denial by blaming others for what you've shared.

THE CIRCLE AND THE TRIANGLE

The symbol of the circle and triangle is an ancient spiritual symbol meaning mind, body, and spirit together as one.

In AA, this symbol represents the three parts of our program (recovery, unity, service) which are the solutions to the three-part disease of alcoholism (physical, mental and spiritual). The circle surrounding the triangle represents Alcoholics Anonymous as a whole. The equilateral triangle is the strongest construction structure known to us. Because all three sides are equal, the triangle represents the balance required among all 36 principles in order for us to stay sober.

So the solution to our alcoholism is found in the Three Legacies (Recovery, Unity and Service) passed down to us by our co-founders, Dr. Bob, Bill W. and the first pioneers of AA, Each legacy has twelve guiding spiritual principles. A total of 36 guiding principles. Each of spiritual principles are contained in the Big Book of Alcoholics Anonymous (Recovery, Unity, Service), the Twelve and Twelve (Recovery and Unity), and the General Service Manual (Service).

The following is an explanation of each of the Legacies and it's Spiritual Principles:

RECOVERY/MIND/THE INDIVIDUAL (MENTAL OBSESSION)

✓ The Set of Twelve Spiritual Principles (the 12 Steps), used to recover from alcoholism, are found in the first part of the Big Book, ending on page 164 and in the Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions.

✓ The 12 Steps are known as Recovery and it is the entire foundation of our program. Thus it is the bottom of the triangle, holding up Unity and Service. The physical compulsion and the mental obsession are removed when we have completed the 12 Steps. Then comes the promise, we have recovered from a "seemingly hopeless state of mind and body". Unity and Service cannot be a part of our lives unless we are practicing these principles in all our affairs. We cannot give away what we do not have ourselves.

✓ So in order to determine whether we are in fit spiritual condition, we do a nightly inventory as part of Step 11 (BB 86:1):

"When we retire at night, we constructively review our day. Were we resentful, selfish, dishonest or afraid? Do we owe an apology? Have we kept something to ourselves which should be discussed with another person at once? Were we kind and loving toward all? What could we have done better? Were we thinking of ourselves most of the time? Or were we thinking of what we could do for others, of what we could pack into the stream of life? But we must be careful not to drift into worry, remorse or morbid reflection, for that would diminish our usefulness to others. After making our review we ask God's forgiveness and inquire what corrective measures should be taken."



UNITY/BODY/THE AA GROUP (PHYSICAL)

✓ The 12 spiritual principles used within the fellowship are the 12 Traditions found in the Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions and the Appendix of

the Big Book (Fourth Edition).

The second Legacy, Unity (Body) suggests we join a home group and participate in the meetings. In early sobriety, meetings and fellowship with recovered alcoholics can help to keep a newcomer sober until they have completed their steps and found a higher power. The fellowship of AA is the group members and is fondly referred to as "the meeting before the meeting, the AA meeting, and the meeting after the meeting."

More importantly, however, the group and its members are responsible for making sure that the door to the meeting is open and there for the newcomer.

✓ Do I have a group that I am committed to and involved with? When I am participating in AA and Group Conscious meetings, do I follow the 12 Traditions?

"I am responsible. When anyone, anywhere reaches out for help, I want the hand of AA to be there. And for that: I am responsible."

SERVICE/SPIRITUALITY/THE AA ORGANIZATION (SPIRITUAL MALADY)

✓ Service in AA is based in the 12 spiritual principles known as the 12 Concepts, which are found in the General Service Manual and the Appendix of the Big Book (Fourth Edition). ✓ "12. Having had a spiritual awakening as the result of these steps, we tried to carry the message to another alcoholic and to practice these principles in all our affairs." (BB 60:1) "PRACTICAL EXPERIENCE shows that nothing so much insures immunity from drinking than intense work with other alcoholics. It works when other activities fail. This is our TWELFTH SUGGESTION: Carry this message to other alcoholics!" (BB 89:1)

✓ The current service structure put in place by Bill W. And Dr. Bob allow recovered alcoholics to have resources at their disposal in order to help another

alcoholic achieve sobriety.

✓ Am I working with other alcoholics taking them through the twelve steps? Am I practicing all of the spiritual principles inside and outside AA? Am I restless, irritable or discontent? If AA is the 12 Steps, the fellowship, and working with others, where am I with my program?

OPPORTUNITIES FOR SERVICE

QUALIFICATIONS

FOR ALL POSITIONS WITHIN INTERGROUP, A COMMITMENT OF YOUR TIME AND A DESIRE TO BE OF SERVICE ARE THE MAIN QUALIFICATIONS.

THE INTERGROUP COMMITTEE MEMBERS SHOULD HAVE A GOOD LEVEL OF SOBRIETY; TWO YEARS IS SUGGESTED.

WEBSERVANT

The Webservant should have a good knowledge of organizing and maintaining a website.

The Webservant is a member of the office committee. The office committee is one part of Regina and Area Intergroup.

The Webservant and committee:

- Make all efforts to ensure the website is relevant.
- Make amendments to the calendar and list of upcoming events in a timely manner.
- Make amendments to the online meeting lists in a timely manner.
- Make all efforts possible to ensure that anonymity is preserved for all content on this site.
- Make all efforts possible to ensure that any material on this site is in keeping with all of AA's other Traditions.

Members of the office and/or Regina Intergroup committees are asked to attend one Office and one Intergroup meeting per month or have their cochair attend.

✓ OFFICE TRUSTEE

- Sees that AA information pertinent to groups is copied and mailed to the listed group contact.
- Trustee works closely with the Central Office Manager, the Central Office Chair, and the Intergroup Chair.
- Ensures up to date meeting lists, which provide information regarding times and places of AA meetings, are maintained.
- Ensures a 24-hour telephone help line is maintained.
- Supervise all expenditures of the office.
- Review monthly all literature sales, purchases, and mailings.
- Submits an annual budget to Intergroup.
- Presents major policy, financial, location or staff changes to Intergroup Committee for review.
- Meets monthly with the Central Office Committee to deal with business pertaining to the central office and it's sub-committees.
- Presents a Central Office Report to the monthly Intergroup meeting.

✓ SECRETARY


- Along with the chair, has the responsibility of preparing the meeting agenda.
- Takes comprehensive minutes, including details of all motions, seconders, and whether it passed or was defeated.
- Has completed minutes distributed promptly of regular and special meetings.
 Ensures a copy is archived at Central Office.


